# Pastor's Reflection: 21ST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Isaiah 66:18-21, Hebrews 12:5-7, 11-13, Luke 13:22-30

Brothers and Sisters in Christ, Peace be with you!

As we gather on this Twenty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time, I invite you to reflect with me on some important questions: What does it mean to strive for something? How often do we consider the paths we choose in our lives? And more importantly, are we willing to enter through the "narrow gate" that leads us to spiritual growth?

Today's readings provide a framework through which we can explore these questions.

In the First Reading, from the Book of Prophet Isaiah, we hear God proclaiming His desire to gather all nations and peoples. It's a reminder that God's embrace extends beyond familiar boundaries; He invites us all into His fold.

This sets the stage for understanding the journey we are called to undertake—one that requires commitment and intentionality. God promises that those who come to Him will be welcomed, yet we must be willing to take the steps necessary to enter that space of grace.

In the letter to the Hebrews, we are reminded that discipline is an essential part of our spiritual journey. We often see challenges in life as obstacles, but the writer urges us to view them differently—as signs of God's love and guidance. When we face difficulties, it's a chance to grow stronger in our faith and understanding.

The passage encourages us to embrace these moments as they help us become the people God intends us to be, leading us toward that narrow gate.

In the Gospel of Luke, Jesus speaks about the narrow gate and the struggle to enter it. This imagery calls us to consider the choices we make daily. The path toward our spiritual home is not always the easiest. It might require us to let go of comfort zones, face trials, and serve others even when it's inconvenient.

Christ emphasizes the importance of making a conscious effort to enter through that gate, indicating that it's not an automatic process but requires diligence and sincerity.

As we reflect on these readings, let's encourage one another to strive for that narrow gate. Let's support one another in our journeys, reminding each other that even when the path seems steep, we are never alone. God is with us, always welcoming us to seek Him.

May we, therefore, accept this invitation to deepen our relationship with Him and grow ever closer to His kingdom.
